Description:

This is a magnificent cultivar that forms a stately mounded shrub with rich green glossy foliage; regal red trumpet-shaped flowers rebloom all season and attract hummingbirds; very, very showy, ideal for the mixed garden border

Ornamental Features

Sonic Bloom Red Reblooming Weigela features showy clusters of red trumpet-shaped flowers along the branches from late spring to mid fall. It has attractive green deciduous foliage which emerges coppery-bronze in spring. The glossy pointy leaves are highly ornamental but do not develop any appreciable fall color.

Landscape Attributes

Sonic Bloom Red Reblooming Weigela is a dense multi-stemmed deciduous shrub with a mounded form. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other landscape plants with less refined foliage.

This shrub will require occasional maintenance and upkeep, and should only be pruned after flowering to avoid removing any of the current season's flowers. It is a good choice for attracting hummingbirds to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

- Hedges/Screening
- General Garden Use

Planting & Growing

Sonic Bloom Red Reblooming Weigela will grow to be about 5 feet tall at maturity, with a spread of 5 feet. It tends to fill out right to the ground and therefore doesn't necessarily require facer plants in front, and is suitable for planting under power lines. It grows at a medium rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 30 years.

This shrub should only be grown in full sunlight. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America.
